SECOND SUNDAY IN LENT



Sr. Mary Jean's Column Meeting the Lord from Liturgy to the Laundromat...

How is Lent going for you? Have you lived the first week of Lent any differently from the days before Ash Wednesday?

The first ten days of Lent gave us abundant opportunities to meet the Lord from liturgies to the laundromat.

The liturgies during the Diocesan Lenten Revival challenged us to live a life more closely attuned to the gospel message and to trust more fully in the power of the Spirit in our lives. In case you missed it, the videos can be viewed on the St. Agnes-Our Lady of Fatima website.

The liturgy at public hall with our catechumen and candidates along with thousands of people from all over the diocese was inspiring and hopeful as we saw how alive the church is in Northeast Ohio.

The laundromat at 105th street was also an opportunity to encounter a sense of community and the love of Christ. I had the occasion to spend about 4 hours at the laundromat helping a family that had not had access to a washer or dryer for many weeks.

As we worked to load the washers and as I learned how to pay for them on my phone, we encountered only kindness and real charity. Younger folks there helped me and my friend (who has a wounded leg) load the washers and dryers, bag the clean clothes, and even carry them out to the van for us.

There was a sense of camaraderie among the group and they freely accepted us "newcomers" into their community. I sensed that this was the way the community of the laundromat operated every week – with a deep respect for everyone there and a willingness to share and help each other.

Feast of St. Joseph—March 19

This year the feast of St. Joseph is very significant for all of us at St. Aloysius Parish. It is the actual date, 100 years ago, that the church was consecrated and dedicated by Archbishop Joseph Schrembs.

It was described as follows in an article from the diocesan archives.

The church, consecrated on March 19, 1925, by Archbishop Schrembs, is a splendid adaption of the Romanesque, developed in tapestry brick and stone. Triple doorways of bronze, surmounted by a canopy bearing a statue of St. Aloysius, feature the front façade. Seven pillars at either side of the nave support the baldachin which has an embroidered purple dossier. The domed tabernacle of the white marble high alter carries a mosaic panel. High over the altar is a painting, "Christ the Teacher."
